All Saints' Day - Wednesday.

Holyday of obligation - Masses as on Sunday - No late parish Mass!!!

Solemn Mass at 9:00. (No academic procession.)

Sermon on Catholic Education by Father Carrico, at 7:00 and 9:00.

Tomorrow, Vigil of All Saints' - fast and abstinence - dispensed for faculty and students. (Dispensation contingent on your "doing the work you are supposed to do.")

Indulgences for the Poor Souls begin at noon Wednesday.

All Souls' Day - Thursday.

Every priest says three Masses. Try to hear three.

Poor Souls' Indulgences extend till evening of Thursday.

Conditions for these indulgences:

Be in the state of grace;

Receive Holy Communion Wednesday or Thursday;

Visit church or hall chapels and pray each visit for the intentions of the Holy Father.

A plenary indulgence may be gained for a poor soul each visit.

Closing of Rosary Devotions Thursday evening, 7:00 and 7:30.

Poor Souls' Novena begins Friday.

Prayers for the Novena are said publicly at 5:00 in the Brownson Memorial Chapel.

(Saturdays at 12:30; Sundays at 7:00 and 7:30.)

First Friday.

Mass of Exposition, 6:25, Brownson Chapel.

Adoration until 5:00 p.m., same chapel.

Benediction and Novena prayers, 5:00 p.m., Brownson Chapel.
