Receive Them, O Lord!

As the new scholastic year opens, Notre Dame pauses reverently to pray for the Notre Dame men who have died during the summer.

The Rev. Julius Nieuwland, C.S.C., ('99), stricken suddenly on June 11 while examining the chemical laboratories of Catholic University at Washington, D.C. As illustrious professor and world-famous authority and leader in the field of physical chemistry, as inventor of Lewisite and of synthetic rubber, Father Nieuwland brought incalculable prestige and glory to Notre Dame. Respected by the world at large for his brilliant mind and untiring labors, Father Nieuwland is most affectionately remembered by his colleagues and students as a truly humble genius with a priestly heart.

Rev. Joseph J. Boyle, C.S.C., ('07), at his death on July 3 President of the University of Portland (Oregon); formerly superior of the Holy Cross Mission Band; first director of laymen's retreats now conducted annually at Notre Dame. Among more recent Notre Dame alumni, Father Boyle will be best recalled as director for several different years of the students' mission that opens the scholastic year.

Mr. G. K. Chesterton (LL. D., '30), lecturer in the University during the fall of 1930; internationally-known Catholic apologist, extraordinary man of letters. (Mr. Chesterton was to return to lecture again to Notre Dame students during the present scholastic year.)

William H. Barnett, member of this year's senior class, Notre Dame cheerleader for three years, injured in an auto accident on August 13, died in his home town, Dawson Springs, Kentucky, August 15, Feast of the Assumption of Our Blessed Lady.

Henry Curtin, who would have been a junior in commerce this year, died on June 18 in Woonsocket, Rhode Island, of septic throat infection following a severe attack of tonsillitis.

Messrs. Alfred Schreiber and Frank Rdzok, two Holy Cross seminarians, in theology, drowned on July 4 at a summer camp near Oakland, Maryland.

Rev. Moses McGarry, C.S.C., at the time of his death on July 11, 1936, oldest priest of the Congregation of Holy Cross, one-time assistant superior general of his congregation. Rev. Angus MacDonald, C.S.C., missionary priest and instructor at St. Edward's University, Austin, Texas.

Through Our Lady's intercession, may they, and all the Notre Dame dead, have happiness eternal in God, with His saints!
