'Very Strange Man.'

Sometimes when I think of my friend who is gone, I remember that he never told a "dirty story" and nobody ever dreamed of telling one to him. You never saw him in a small group of men intently listening to one man talking; never heard him joining in that sudden loud burst of laughter that followed the conclusion of the tale.

I do not mean that he was a prude. He was far from that. He told true stories of actual human beings, astounding stories that you probably could not put into print. ....But he told them because he was interested in men and women and things they did and because he knew that you, too, were interested.....He never shared in that interchange of lore that sometimes passes as wit among men.

If you told him some quirk of man or woman that had come to your attention, he would roar with laughter, or he would tell some tale, with a light in his eyes, that would send you into howls of glee.....But he had an idea that sex in itself isn't funny, an idea that not everybody accepts. And you understood that for him life was too full, too rich and fascinating, for him to spend any part of it in triviality.

I said that nobody ever told him a "dirty story"....but I remember that once a man came bursting into his office, slammed his hat on my friend's desk, and began to tell him the best story in his repertoire.....When he finished, he waited for the loud laughter.....and it did not come. My friend was as unmoved as though he were a great African lion and continued the conversation that had been interrupted by the clown. It was cruel, and I could see the joker was crestfallen and hurt and mystified. Afterwards he confided to me that my friend was "a very strange man, a very strange man, indeed," and I agreed.
