An apologetics student, two members of the Student Committee for Decency-in-Print and a representative of The Scholastic are all bound for Chicago Saturday to participate in the midwest regional conference of the Catholic School Press Association to be held at Mundelein College.

Marquette, Loyola, DePaul, Rosary, Notre Dame and other midwest collegians, ladies & gentlemen, will put their heads together on this modern problem: "Propaganda: What Is It and Why?"

It is going to be something worthwhile with the principal address to be delivered by Father Daniel A. Lord, S.J. on "Propaganda and Social Responsibility." Other questions to be considered you might talk over yourselves in the rooms:

When the Blessed Sacrament is exposed, as it is every day during October, in the Lady Chapel, why not avail yourself of a plenary indulgence granted July 24, 1933 by the late Holy Father, Pope Pius XI? All you need do is recite five Our Fathers, Hail Marys and Glorias and add one of each, afterwards, for the intention of the Pope.

One of the prerequisites for gaining the indulgence is that you shall have been to Confession and Communion. That is not difficult to accomplish here.

There is an indulgence of fifteen years for every visit made to the Blessed Sacrament exposed for adoration, provided the visit is made "with at least a contrite heart."

Love For The Missions Through Love Of The Liturgy.

It has always been difficult in the past to maintain on the campus a unit of the C.S.M.C. which was truly worthy of the great aims of the Catholic Students' Mission Crusade. It was hard to make the thing thrive on the college level.
