Shall I Be A Brute? Or Shall I Be A God?

God endowed me with a marvelous nature, a composite one. Philosophers point to me as a cosmos of the universe-- a little world in myself. In me you can find rational life, animal life, sentient life, vegetative life. (Of course; in the totally bald there is a proportionate diminution of vegetative life.)

Essentially, I am a body and a soul combined in one being. I am a rational animal.

In common with the brute, I have a bundle of nerves, I have muscles and impulses. But in common with the angels and God Himself, I have two spiritual faculties, an intellect and a will. In all the universe only they and I can say that.

It does not take a superabundance of brains to figure out that my dignity consists much more in sharing my life with the angels and God than with brutes.

Now life since Original Sin is a warfare. Before that it was one pleasant moment after another. Now it's a struggle.

What struggle? The struggle of brute vs angel and God. That is, more exactly, the struggle of the brute-in-me vs the angel-&-God-in-me.

The less dignified passions would rebel, subvert, upturn, overthrow the domination of my mind and will. As St. Paul said, there is a war in my members.

That war is not sin. It is definitely temptation. It is an undeniable challenge. And I have to act-- one way or the other. Shall I be a brute? Shall I be a god?

If I am intellectually convinced; if I perceive and value my dignity; if I love God; then, no matter how much the pressure, how fierce, how frequent, how utterly unreasonable, my choice is instant and irrevocable. No mere animal, and helped by the grace of God, I shall act always as a man, as a good angel, as a sensible son of God.

Hence, though I'm minded to burst into anger, I shall hold my temper; though I crave thrills against reason and drink upon drink, I shall say "Nix!" or "Scat!". *** No mere brute, I am determined ALWAYS to act like a god. Otherwise I cease being a MAN.
