Chair of Unity Octave.

"Dear Father: Each year at this time we beg to call your attention to the Chair of Unity Octave which will be observed as usual from January 18th to 25th. During this eight-day period of prayer for the reunion of Christendom under the authority of Christ's Vicar on earth, we will be joined in prayer for this holy end by many millions of our fellow Catholics all over the world.

"May I ask you to remind those under your charge of the forthcoming Chair of Unity Octave and urge them to observe it as best as circumstances will permit? Our Holy Father, Pope Pius XII, will personally participate in the Octave by offering his private Mass on the opening day, January 18, the feast of St. Peter's Chair at Rome, for the intentions of the Octave....."that they all may be one."

"In accordance with the wishes of the Holy Father, the name of this devotion has been changed from Church Unity Octave to Chair of Unity Octave."--Fr. Lewis Furlan, S.A.

What's This About?

Christ prayed at the Last Supper that the world would be united in one Faith, that it would be united in Him Who alone is the Way, the Truth and the Life.
