SUNDAY BEGINS the greatest and the holiest week of the year. The week is a picture of the Christian life. beginning as it does with "Hosanna to our King". At the font on the day of our welcoming Christ into our own soul, Christ was received with the very same kind of excitement. On that occasion, He made us His disciples and gave us the cross.

One of the principal purposes of this week is to renew the first welcome and to help prepare us for the second. The palm the Church will put in our hands on Sunday is a symbol of victory. But she admonishes us as she gives it to us, "let the same mind be in you which is also in Christ Jesus". This is simply to say that the world today needs Catholic men whose Palm Sunday joy will not be lessened as the cross grows heavier.

We tend to forget the sacred mark indelibly printed on our souls at Bap-

tism, that mark which neither time nor eternity can efface. This sets us apart and confers upon us a dignity all our own. By it we all become partakers in the priesthood of Christ. By virtue of it, we should be prompted "with a fearless voice to confess the great name of God's only-begotten Son before the kings and powers of this world."

The world today needs men who will grow daily in their vision of the eternal Easter glory that has been prepared for all who "follow the example of Christ's patience and are made,

while on earth, partakers of His resurrection". We should pray then during this week that the bodily mortifications and sacrifices undertaken during the weeks of Lent will perfect us spiritually and enable us to gain a victory over the world, the flesh, and the devil.
