

Does the perfect leader exist? Christ losses and an account of the blind. He never found the perfect leader. And account on who look today for the perfect leader among students are a larger to find him either.

However, this doesn't warrant our despairing. Rather, it ought to make our search that much more practical. For now we realize that we must look for personalities who, while not perfect, nevertheless, have leadership tendencies or abilities.

There are several levels and kinds of leadership. But first let's try to understand what is meant by a leader. A leader is one who understands what he is trying to do and influences others to help him in attaining this goal. Obviously, this includes negative leadership (i.e. for evil) as well as positive or constructive leadership. So, the idea of "leader" and "influence" are practically the same. Every man can become a leader. And every day it becomes clearer that every Christian must become a leader.

The requirements for leadership are easily stated, but rarely recognized, and still less often properly developed. Eriefly, they are: 1) common sense, 2) intelligence, 3) generosity, and 4) a spiritual outlook. Common sense is essential. Without it we can have no leaders. Many who have a spiritual outlook on life, complete generosity and a high IQ have failed as leaders because they have lacked a down-to-earth practicality (common sense).

Unusual intelligence isn't necessary. But it does help in gaining the respect and cooperation of others. Good judgment and some initiative is necessary, though. These provide the leader with a greater vision of his mission. And the man of vision will see problems of the hour as they relate to his final aim or goal.

And generosity is another essential. Without it, enthusiasm dwindles under set-backs and apparent failures.

Concerning the spiritual outlook, keep in mind that habits of grace, prayer, good family training, study and work are indications of character and a solid foundation for leadership.
