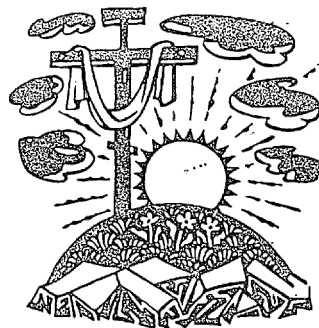

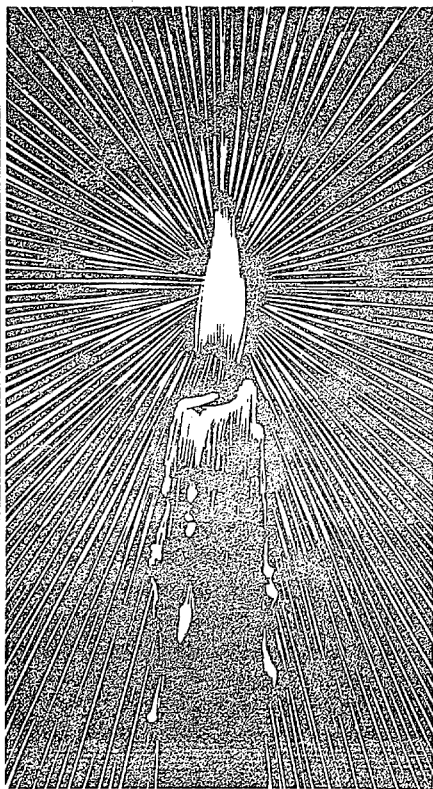

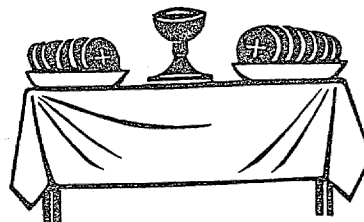

HOLY CROSS: BEFORE AND BEYOND

This year the Holy Cross Priests and Brothers celebrate the one hundred and fiftieth anniversary of their founding. On March 1, 1837, the Brothers of St. Joseph and the Auxiliary Priests of the diocese of Le Mans, France, were brought together under the leadership of Rev. Basile Moreau. Since its headquarters was in the commune of Sainte-Croix (Holy Cross), the new community was known simply as the Congregation of Sainte-Croix (C.S.C.).

Founded to revive the religious institutions shattered by the French Revolution, the Holy Cross Brothers and Priests were soon invited to serve outside of France. In 1841, they came to the United States to work among the native Americans and the immigrant settlers on the Indiana frontier. From this mission came the University of Notre Dame, four other colleges and universities, and more than twenty high schools in addition to parishes, retreat centers and other ministries.

American Holy Cross Brothers and Priests, in turn, have planted the community elsewhere in the world: Chile, Brazil and Peru in South America; Ghana, Liberia, Kenya and Uganda in Africa; and Bangladesh in Asia. The Holy Cross Sisters, originally an integral part of the same community, also serve in most of these lands. The Holy Cross Associates, lay volunteers who serve for a term of one or two years, share the life and work of the community both in the United States and overseas.

This year's sesquicentennial celebration is an occasion to note that if Holy Cross has been blessed with long life and a large family, God has asked for generous and faithful service to his people. For what has been, thanks, For what will come, courage.
