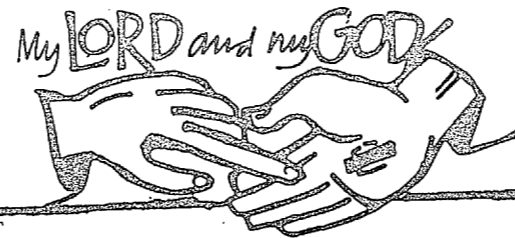

Give me a BREAK!

For most college students, fall and spring break mean relaxation, getting away from school and books, and enjoying life outside the university.

Next break, why not consider visiting a place you've probably never seen, meeting people that are pleasantly different from yourself and making a contribution to their community at the same time? Why not consider a service project in Appalachia.

Appalachia is a mountain chain extending from Pennsylvania to Northern Georgia and is home to some of the poorest people in the United States. In an attempt to expose Notre Dame and St. Mary's students to a different lifestyle and give them the opportunity to help others, the Center for Social Concerns arranges for groups of students to work at various sites throughout the area during fall and spring break.

If you decide to go to Appalachia, you may find yourself building a barn, milking goats, or distributing food and clothing to the residents, but you will also find yourself growing: intellectually, emotionally, and spiritually. The week I spent in the mountains of South-Eastern Kentucky gave me that needed change of pace and scenery, but it also gave me a tremendous feeling of accomplishment and a greater sense of awareness. That one short week proved to be one of the most valuable experiences of my life.
