CLYBOURNE PARK BY BRUCE NORRIS

DIRECTOR'S NOTE

Bruce Norris's extraordinary play, Clybourne Park, won the Tony and Olivier Awards and the Pulitzer Prize for best play. Indeed, Clybourne Park may be the only non-musical to win all three awards, in the company of Fiorello! (1960), How to Succeed in Business Without Really Trying (1962), A Chorus Line (1976), and one of my all-time favorites, Sunday in the Park with George (1991).

Norris confronts and deals with racism, gentrification, and the failure to communicate and suggests that we might be missing opportunities for growth as we encounter those who are different from ourselves. When Norris names a Jewish grocery store owner after a living Chicago physicist, a Nobel Prize winner who pioneered the "strangeness" theory of elementary particles, perhaps he is hinting that the characters in *Clybourne Park* (and by extension we in the audience) are missing the chance to see things that previously were invisible.

FROM THE ARCHIVES

This is the premiere production at Notre Dame of Bruce Norris's 2011 Pulitzer Prize winning play which debuted at Playwrights Horizons Theater in New York City in February 2010. Other recent productions of Pulitzer Prize winning plays in FTT's mainstage season include Wendy Wasserstein's *The Heidi Chronicleo* (February 1993), Paula Vogel's *How I Learned to Drive* (November 2002), and David Auburn's *Proof* (February 2011).

Clybourne Park owes its plotline, of course, to Lorraine Hansberry's A Raisin in the Sun (1959), which the Department most recently produced in Washington Hall in February 1994. The 1972 Notre Dame yearbook, the Dome, cryptically suggests a production, probably by a touring company, and in 1984 notes that Ruby Dee and Ossie Davis read scenes from A Raisin in the Sun for Notre Dame's Black Cultural Arts Festival.
